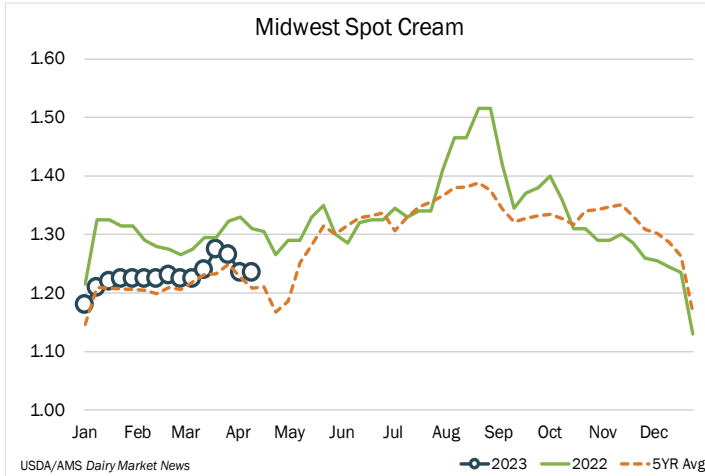
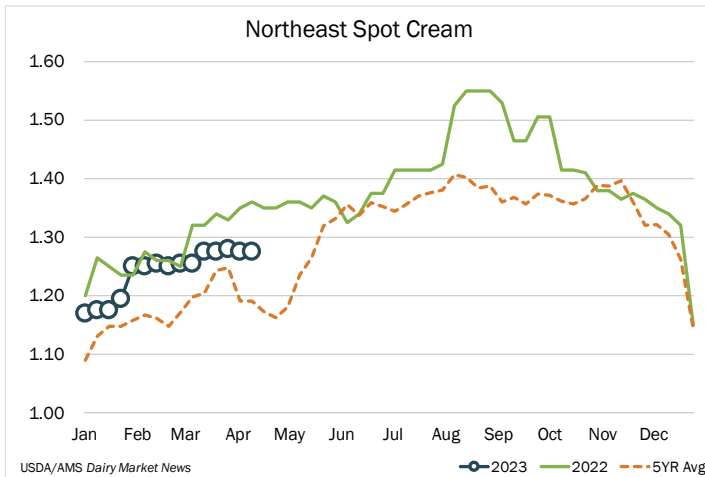

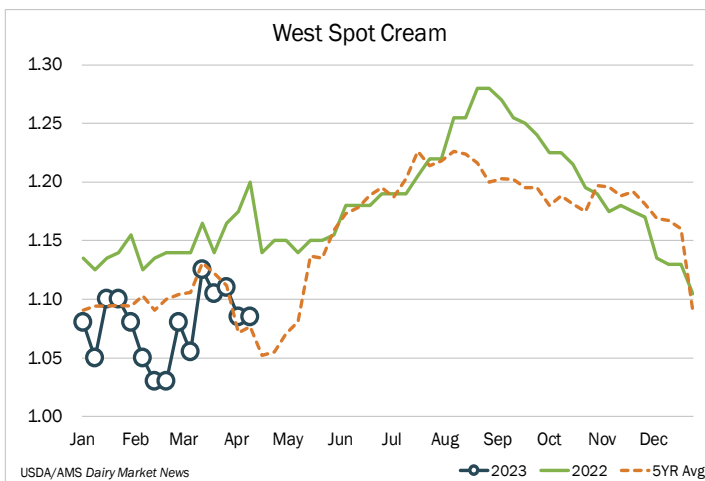

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Here is what USDA/AMS had to say:

Midwest: Cream multiples held steady this week, as some contacts expected. Cream suppliers say butter plants are and have been very busy in recent weeks, even during and following the holiday weekend. Ice cream demand has yet to shift into another gear after a late winter uptick in ice cream manufacturing slowed in March.

Northeast: Cream multiples for supplies going into Class II are remaining steady due to activity in the Mid-Atlantic states where cream is slightly tighter than in the Northeast.

West: Plentiful amounts of cream are available to keep strong production schedules. Cream multiples were unchanged this week.
