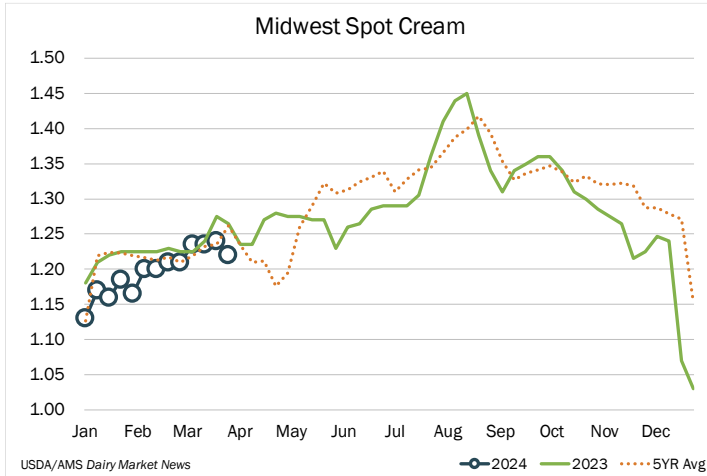
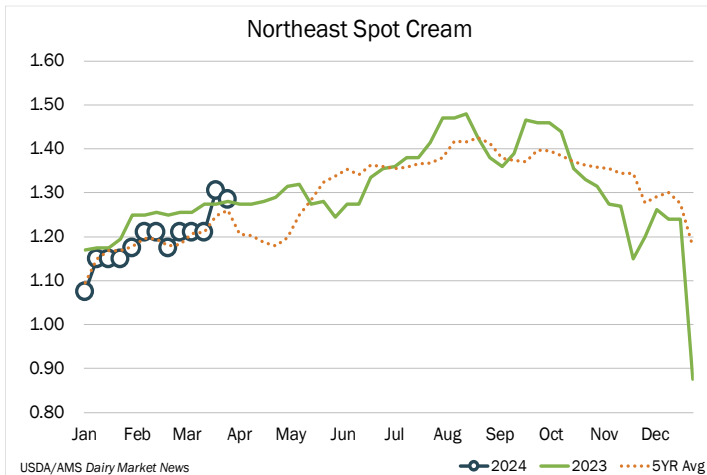

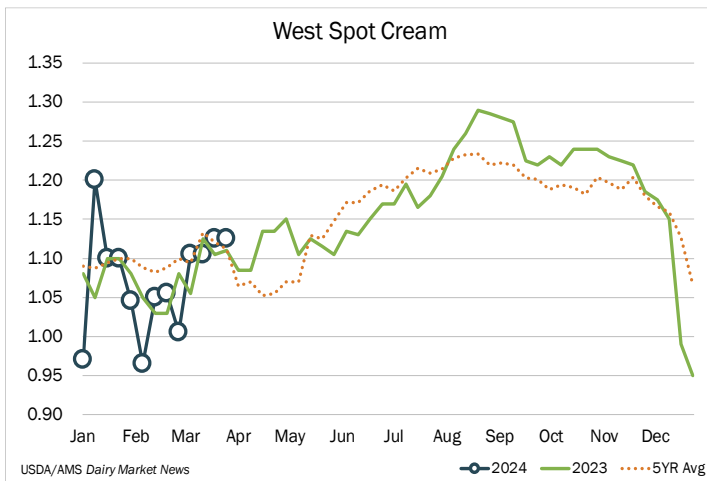

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Here is what USDA/AMS had to say:

Midwest: Cream availability has grown in the region. Cream demand from Class III plant operators remains somewhat hearty. Butter plant managers relay widely available cream volumes, as some are already booking cream through April at what they consider a value.

Northeast: Cream demand is variable throughout the region and multiples inched slightly higher than last week. In the Mid-Atlantic some share tightness in cream availability and are selling cream on the spot market instead of churning.

West: Cream supplies are ample. Milk components are said to be strong, and plants are able to bring more cream into processing. Cream is available, but demand is noted to be lackluster.
