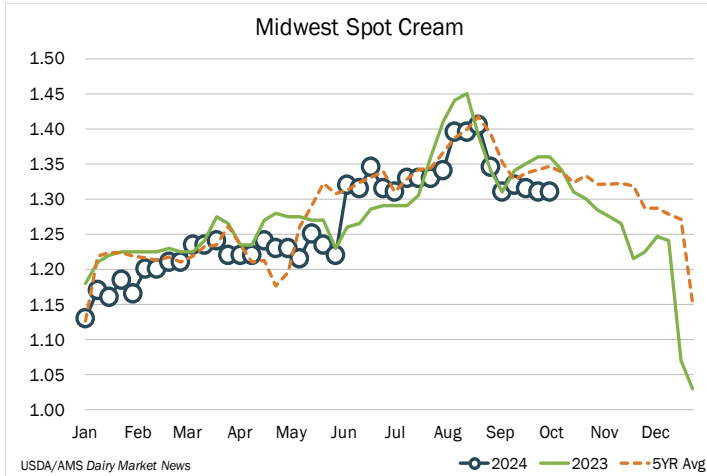
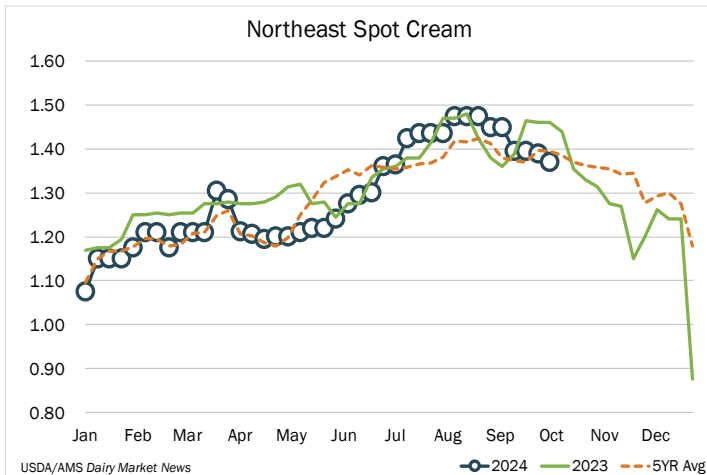

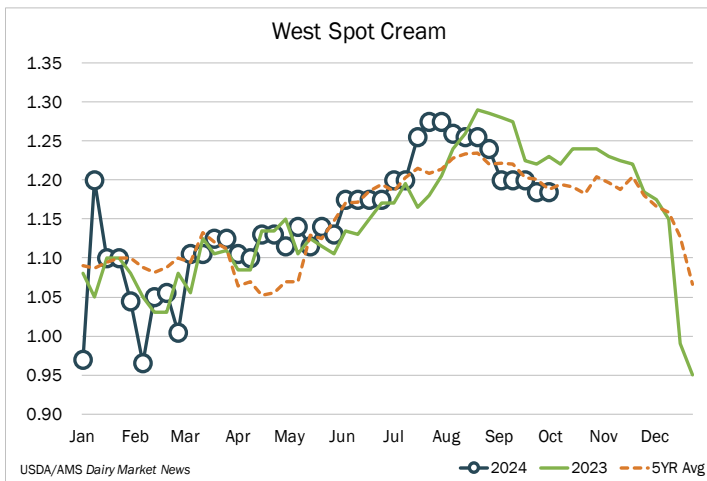

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Here is what USDA/AMS had to say:

Midwest: Cream availability remains far from snug. Cream multiples dropped below 1.20, as butter makers say they are turning down spot cream offers daily. Cream cheese orders have yet to pick up as much seasonal steam as expected. Contacts say they should have a better outlook on quarterly cream cheese activity over the next two weeks.

Northeast: Cream is available for spot purchasers. The All-Class cream multiple range contracted.

West: Cream continues to be widely available. Cream demand varies from steady to lighter domestically. However, cream demand for loads shipped to our southern neighbor is stronger. Cream multiples are unchanged.
