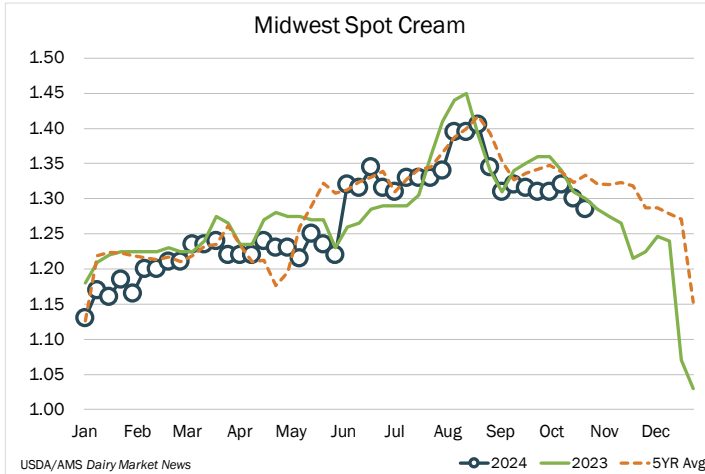
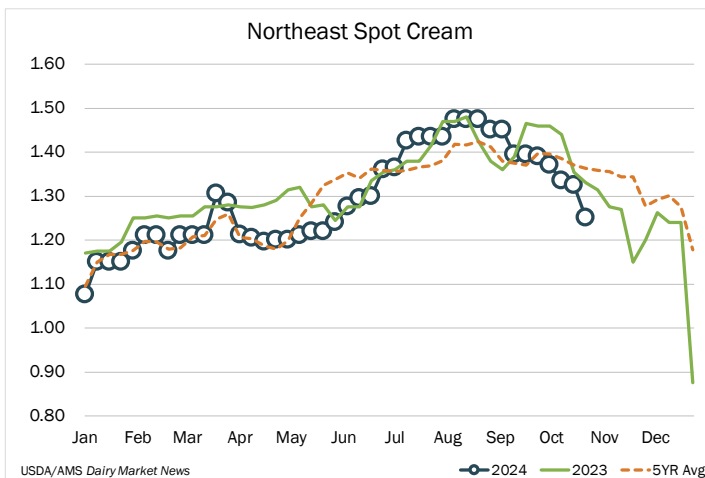

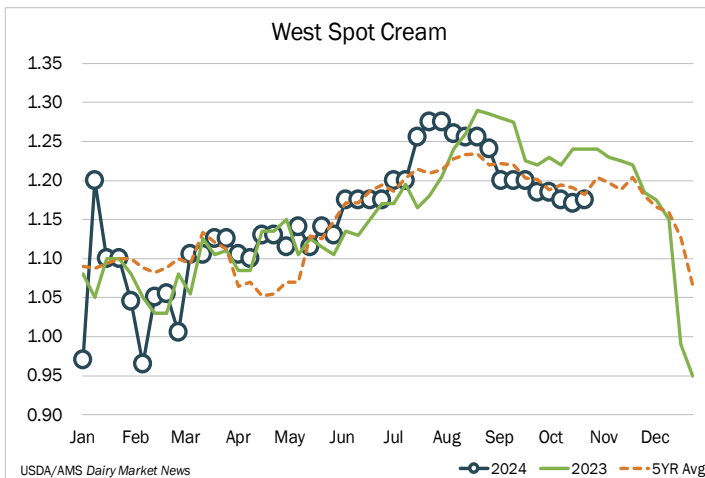

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## Here is what USDA/AMS had to say:

**Midwest:** Cream availability remains ample. Plant downtime was not just for fluid milk end users. Some butter plant contacts also reported downtime this week, despite the abundance of cream available for all uses. Cream cheese processing continues to be somewhat static in seasonally relative terms. Despite an increase on the lower end of the cream multiple range, cream tightness is not expected in the near- to mid-term.

**Northeast:** Spot loads of cream remain more readily available than spot loads of condensed skim. The All-Class cream multiples range moved lower.

**West:** The cream narrative, on the other hand, is following a different path, one of somewhat heavy availability. Contacts throughout the region say cream demand has been tepid.
