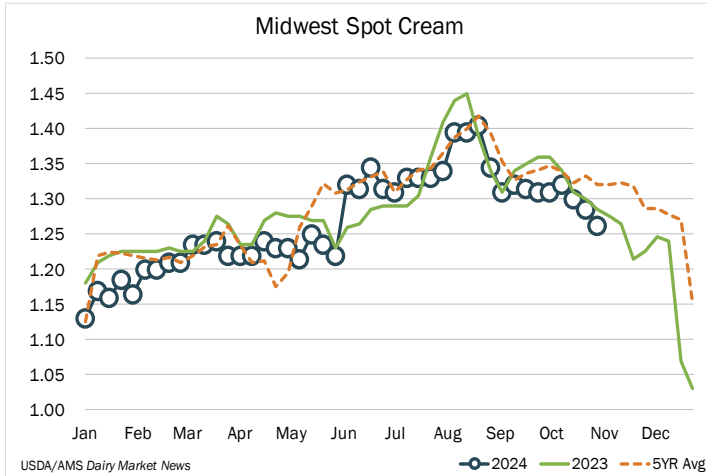
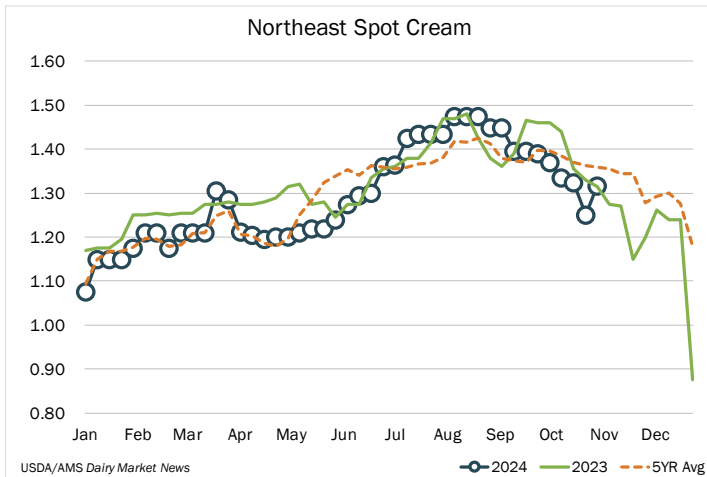

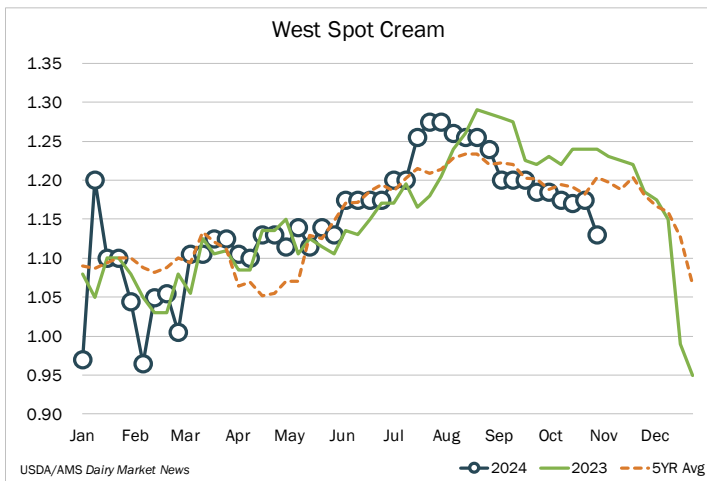

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Here is what USDA/AMS had to say:

Midwest: Cream availability, though, is wide open. Some previous weekend spot cream multiples were reported as low as 1.10. The consensus viewpoint among cream contacts, from both suppliers and end users, is that cream availability will likely remain somewhat available for the remainder of the year. Cream cheese manufacturing is mixed, but some cream suppliers say it is not at expected levels on the eve of November.

Northeast: Spot loads of cream are readily available across the region. The All-Class cream multiples range moved higher. Demand for cream is beginning to shift from Class IV to Class II as cream cheese production ramps up.

West: Plenty of cream is available throughout the region. Although cream multiples moved lower, some stakeholders convey stronger demand for cream, and in some cases, loads are being bought for more eastern region delivery locations.
