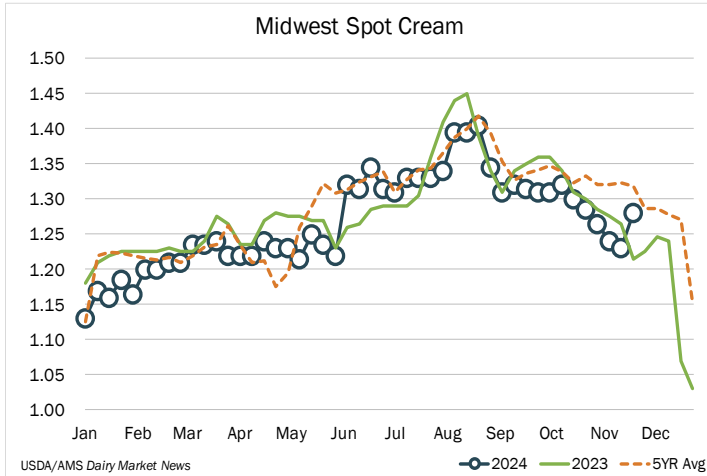
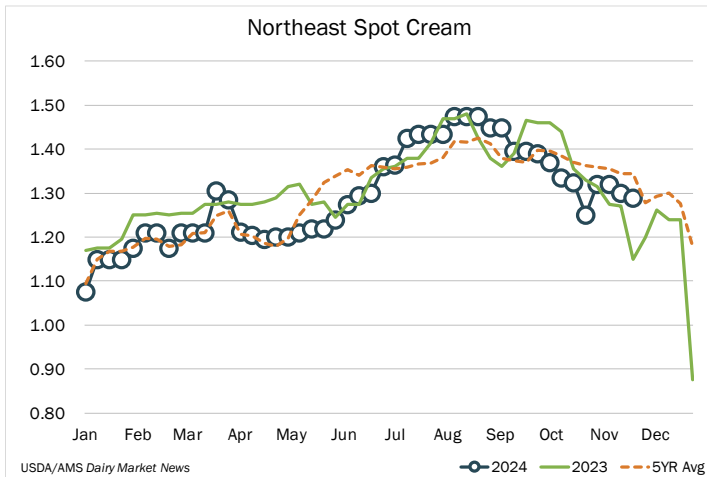

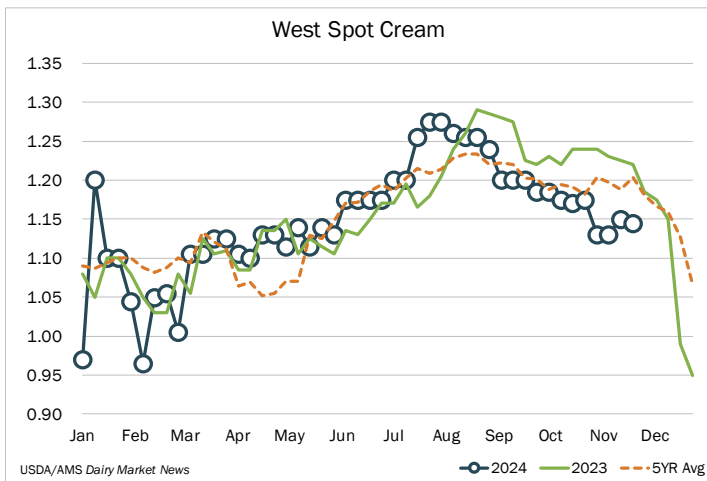

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## Here is what USDA/AMS had to say:

**Midwest:** Cream demand picked up this week, both from Class II and Class III processors. Butter makers say they are still turning away extra spot loads, but cream availability shored up on the low end of the multiple range. Despite turning extra cream down, churning is active in the region. Butter makers and other cream end users are looking ahead to some downtime next week. That said, cream suppliers have suggested Thanksgiving Day is the only day next week that cream has become difficult to situate.

**Northeast:** Spot loads of cream are readily available. Class II demand for cream is steady as ice cream production slows; production of whips and dips have filled the gap before the holiday season. Cream demand from Class IV is steady. Butter processors are keeping their cream inventories full of contract loads and have little demand for cream spot loads.

**West:** Despite some stakeholders conveying slightly stronger cream demand, cream multiples ticked lower on the top end of both ranges this week as cream volumes remain readily available throughout most of the region.
